The UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE PLAN

To the Employer...

Contributions to the Unemployment Insurance Fund become payable as from July 1st, 1941.

Contributions are made by the employer and the employee, and are paid by the purchase of Unemployment Insurance stamps by the employer from the Post Offices.

The employee's contributions are deducted from his wages by the employer.

Stamps will be affixed to a special book, called the Insurance Book, of record of contributions, and when he becomes unemployed, the book is returned to the Post Office, where it forms the record from which insurance benefits may be paid. Full details will be sent to you when you have returned the postcard attached to a form which is now in the mails.

The plan of procedure has been adopted after consultation with employers and employees' associations and is one which has been based upon thirty years' experience in Great Britain.

The Dominion Government adds \$250 to the combined employer-employee contributions.

Employers, all of Whose employees are liable to be insured, are required to list below, the names of the employees

1. Signature, birthdate and home address of each employee.
2. Filing.
3. Lumbering and logging activities of each employee.
4. Season and trapping, or by sea and land.
5. Domestic service in a private home.
6. Employment in a hospital or charitable institution not carried on for profit.
7. Professional service in a hospital or charitable institution not carried on for profit.
8. Teaching.
9. Members of the armed forces or police or in the public service.
10. Service in the Government of Canada or in the service of a provincial government.
