If they becom alkaline this favors the growth of germs. The acid-alkali condition is governed by the secretions prothese change from minute to minute. When a person is suffering from a cold, sinusitis or nasal allergy, the secretions become alkaline, furthering the trouble. Rest and sleep overcome the alka-line condition and help restore the membranes to the acid state. Dr. Fabricant's discovery is contrary to a belief generally held that one should alkalinize the body to get




