**COUNCIL ADJUST PAY OF MAN OF MANY TITLES**

Few men have as many titles as the Chief of Police in the average Ontario small village. The Chief of Police here is no exception to this rule.

In addition to the onerous duty of patrolling the streets during the dark hours of the night, Constable Banks is also Warden, Sanitary Inspector, and collector of Dog taxes. But his duties do not stop here. He is also expected to carry out the provisions of every-by-law passed by the corporation since incorporation. In addition to this he must be ready at all times to co-operate with Provincial as well as the police of neighboring municipalities in tracking down criminals. He is on duty twenty four hours daily.

Chief Banks has been performing these duties at the rate of \$2.00 per day since he assumed the position in 1925. The adjusted rate is \$2.50 per day.

His friends lost a friend indeed, for he was a man who did unto others as he would have them do unto him.

All was not lost, however, for this Canadian won for his country a colony—six by the name of Netherlands soil—now overrun by the German hordes; but which forever will remain a part of the country of his birth and of the British Empire.
