Mrs. E. S. Fond moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Fryse and the girls for coming and giving the program. Miss F. Nicol, then voiced our

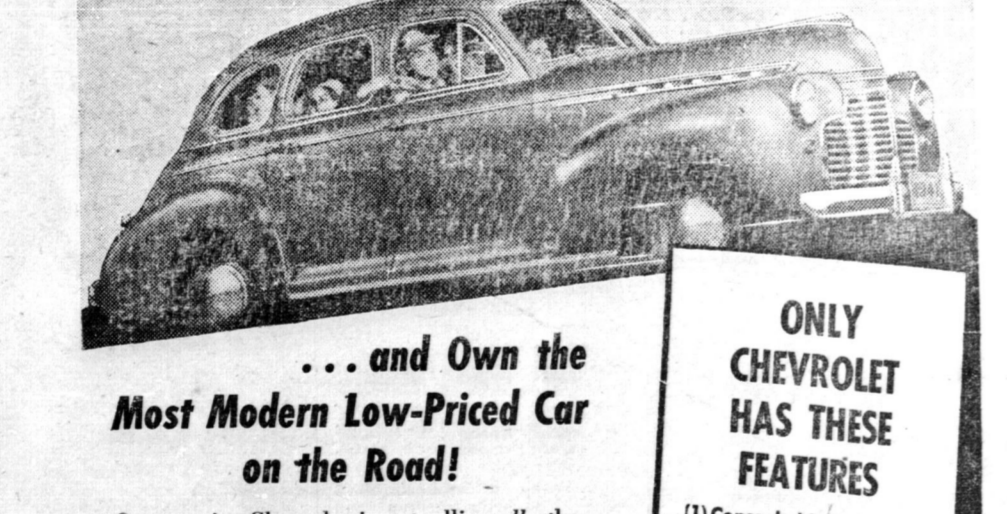
