What was particularly cheerful news, in view of sometimes disturbing accounts of Nazi infiitration, was that he found the "overwhelming" sentiment of South American people in favor of the denrocracies in the world struggle. There had been a great change in sentiment in the past three months. The minister brought word of the signing of trade treaties under "most favored nation" terms with Brazil. Argentina, Chile and Ecuador with the removal of surtaxes and exchange restrictions which had been in force against Canada in scale of the Southern countries.
