The attention of the Good Roads Committee has been drawn to an article appearing in your paper regarding the condition of our Road No. 3 commonly known as the Nanticoke Sideroad. While we do not at any time object to constructive criticism, we feel that the errors in this article should be pointed out and given the publicity they deserve in order that an erronous conception may be corrected.

As you are no doubt aware, prior to the construction of the Air Port this was an asphalt road, quite sufficient in strength to carry the traffic imposed on it by the County, however, with the advent of contractors equipment and the subsequent daily use by traffic, which includes vehicles up to twenty tons, the road has broken down. This, you must admit, is not to be won-

As to the ability of the equipment owned by the County to maintain this road we would point out that, while the machinery is of a suitable type and we have to date spent more than three times the amount in dollars on Maintenance that we ordinarly would, it has not been possible to keep the road in first class shape, owing to continuous heavy traffic. However, when you take into consideration the amount we have spent on Maintenance and the fact that from now until freeze up the Grader must be kept on this road almost continually, de do not feel that the condition complained of can be laid to neglect on our part. The most glaring mis-statement, which we are inclined

to feel was due to wishful thinking on your part is in regard to the help we might expect from the Dominion Government. Although we have approached them on more than one occasion we cannot obtain any financial help towards doing this work. In view of this to say that they are willing to subsidize us to the extent to fifty per cent of the cost has tended to create a very bad feeling and cannot be left uncorrected.

It is true that the Ontario Highway Department will meet dollar for dollar, anything spent by either the County or the Dominion Government but this still, until the Dominion does its share leaves the County with a financial burden which it is in no position to assume, as to put this road in the condition in which it should be would cost. at a conservative estimate, at least seventy-five thousand dollars. Add to that our Road No. 4 to Garnet Field and Road No. 8 connecting Provincial Highway No. 3 and Kohler Field and you will realize that it would be only by sacrificing the remainder of the County Road System that we could do the work you seem to expect of us.
