What Science Is Doing

THE "SULFA" FAMILY
Germinating "sulfa" family, sulfamide, with antibiotic, with amazing success. 32 types of germs that produce pneumonia and 100,000 Americans a year, are cured by-products. New members of the sulfa family are sulfathiazole and sulfamethoxazole. Sulfathiazole is used to treat streptococcal infection of blood stream, fatal in 99% of all known cases. Sulfamethoxazole is used to treat experimentally, they cut the mortality rate to 20%. New sulfamethoxazole, recently announced, joins the sulfa family.

A new remedy for burns, promising speedier healing and a reduction of scar tissue, was disclosed last fortnight in the Bulletin of the Johns Hopkins Hospital by Dr. Kenneth L. Pickrel, resident surgeon of the Baltimore Institution. It is a preparation of sulfadiazine, one of the new sulfa drugs. The method: a severely burned patient is placed in a solution every hour, and kept warm. The frequency of spraying is reduced as the patient improves. In four days a thin scab is formed, which begins to separate from the new skin in ten days. The solution is mild enough to be used on the eyes, and it penetrates the burned area so rapidly that much of the pain is alleviated at once.

How Can I?

Q. How can I drill a hole into the bottom or side of a heavy china vase which I wish to convert into a lamp?
A. Use an ordinary twist drill. The drill should be sharp and have a low pitch. The china should be kept wet with turpentine.

Q. How can I restore chiffon that has acquired a crumpled and lifeless appearance?
A. Hang it in the bathroom and steam the bathroom fill with steam. After a few minutes of this, the chiffon can be taken into the open air where it will return to its bright freshened condition.

Q. How can I remedy the lock of a closet door in which the key refuses to work smoothly?
A. Dip the key into machine oil and then place in the lock and work back and forth several times. It will soon work with ease.

Q. How can I remove an annoying squeak from my black shoes?
A. If the shoes are black, the following is an effective remedy: Place the shoes in a basin and pour in enough linsed oil to cover the soles. Allow to stand until the following day, and the squeak will have disappeared.

Q. Is it true that butter milk is a good cosmetic?
A. Yes. It is claimed to be one of the best cosmetics known. Apply it to the face and hands. The milk may be warmed, but should not be boiled.

Types Faster Than Most People Talk

What are probably the world's fastest fingers belong to Margaret Hanna of Brooklyn, America's super-typist, who pounds out words faster than most horses talk, says American Magazine. Her total for the hour was 45,800 separate strokes—780 per minute, fifteen per second.

1,546 Bags of Mail For Overseas Lost

The post office department announced recently receipt of word that 1,546 bags of Canadian mail destined for the United Kingdom and leaving the Dominion during the last week in August had been lost through enemy action.

Air Training Plan Praised By Duke

The Duke of Kent, back in England from his tour of Canada to study progress of the Commonwealth Air Training Plan, declared in a broadcast that the Dominion can take "special pride in its outstanding success."

He said he had been amazed at the growth of the plan. The people of Britain, he said, have no idea of its magnitude.

Parliament Will Open November 3

The visits and consultations overseas of Premier King and the Conservative Leader, R. B. Hanson, will be reflected when Parliament opens on November 3.

It is expected that two or three weeks will be taken up in general review of Canada's war effort with the first hand information from the missions overseas will have produced. The financial appropriations will suffice till the end of the fiscal year in March.

If there is any emergency legislation of a budgetary character similar to that which was enacted last November, it is expected that it will be introduced in the nature of revised restrictions and the "spend less and save" formula which the Conservative Minister is repeatedly emphasizing. An adjournment from early December till February is regarded as probable.

War Doesn't Stop Progress of Art

More than 200 drawings and paintings by British children have reached the National Gallery in Ottawa and will go on exhibition today and later in various Canadian cities.

War has not been allowed to interfere with the progress of art education in British children. Development of children in England, said H. McCurry, Director of the Gallery.

Bacteriological War Foreseen by Baxter

If Germany begins to lose the war, Hitler will not stop at bacteriological warfare, Beverly Baxter, Minister of Agriculture, said recently after his arrival from Lisbon on the Yankee Clipper.

No Central Canada Pork For Maritimes

"It should not be an added incentive to our farmers to produce our own requirements," he said.

It was announced at Ottawa recently that the banning of pork importations into the Maritimes from Central Canada was one of the measures which the Canadian Bacon Board in an effort to boost the exports to Britain.

Why Shouldn't We Give Britain Food

Hon. R. B. Hanson, Conservative Leader in the Canadian House of Commons, suggested that Canada might donate food from "all our abundance" to help Britain's war effort.

Mr. Hanson interviewed three Cabinet ministers, toured the House of Parliament, signed the visitors' book at Buckingham Palace and made his food suggestion after a conference with representatives of the food requirements of the British.

15,000 Parcels To Prisoners of War

Dr. P. W. Rowley, national commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross, Toronto, said his organization is sending 15,000 parcels a week to continental Europe for prisoners in enemy occupied territory.

The parcels, he said, cost \$1.50 apiece to put up and transportation expenses are \$2.50 each. They contain a week's supply of food, giving 2,000 calories a day.

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Air Battleship's Successful Test

New United States Flying Battleship Passes Initial Severe Tests
A new experimental "air battleship" constructed for the United States Navy and described as the largest flying boat ever built, was given its first static test last week at the Glenn L. Martin Company factory at Middle River.

While Navy inspectors, company officials, newsmen and photographers looked on, hydraulic jacks pulled upward on the plane's wings to give it overhead tests. A special steel frame rig, about as high as a two-story building, enveloped the plane, six towers at each end.

The flying boat, the XPBML-1, has not yet been taken out of the factory. The stationary tests will continue for several days. In about ten days or two weeks, officials said, it will be rolled out for the first time and in a month or six weeks it will be ready for its test flight.

The all-metal flying boat has a 300-foot wingspan, a two-story hull 117 feet long, is powered by four 2,000-horsepower Wright diesel engines, and has a normal gross weight of 140,000 pounds. Its armaments are a secret.

The giant boat dwarfs the Martin-built Russian Clipper of 62,000 pounds, the largest flying boat previously constructed, and the trail blazer China Clipper of 52,000 pounds normal gross weight.

The attack almost failed when thousands of spectators blocked the roads to see the demonstration unit dash through the streets. The crowd thinned, however, after a "gas" bombardment bathed the area with clouds of thick vapor.

British Officials Cross Germany

British diplomatic personnel left Helsinki by train recently, en route to Turkey, to board the Finnish ship Olhonna for Luebeck, Germany, on the way to Lisbon and home. Finland and Britain have broken diplomatic relations.
