Q. How can I prevent delicate-colored wash materials from fading?
A. Before they are washed,

soak them in lukewarm water, to which a few drops of turpentine have been added. Q. How can I wash straw matting?

Wash the matting with cloth dampened in hot salt water, using a handful of salt to a bucket of hot water. Wash only a small space at a time and wipe dry at once. This also prevents it from turning yellow.




The postmen recently brought British taxpayers the first income tax bills under a new law calling for up to half of all they earned n the year ending last April 5. William S. Knudsen, Directo

General of the OPM, asserted recently that even an extra 15 minutes work by every American would step up arms production so much it would bring about Hitler's defeat and cut short the duration of the war "by a substantial margin."

"If every man working today worked one extra hour a day, six days a week, that would be something like an extra 300,000,000 man hours per week and that would produce a lot more planes, ships, tanks and guns," he said.


