

This is an "up angle" stunt shot, but you could also turn things right around and take a "straight down" shot—maybe from the upper stairway landing—that would be just as interesting.

Another stunt that provides lots of fun is to have part of a subject too close to the camera, so that 't' you place a piece of cardboard a foot or two in front of the light, high enough so it just shades the thread but doesn't shade the subject. And the thread is then "lost" against the shadows in the background—it isn't even there.

Try some of these stunts. They'll give you a whole evening of fun—and you'll get pictures that really surprise your friends.
