Millions of hens and prairie hogs cackle and root for Britain as Can-adian farmers pledge themselves to raise more food for the island "Wanted-Two more eggs per

onth from every hen in 1942," s the keynote of the current npaign launched by the Canadan Department of Agriculture. In effort to mobilize more than 45,000,000 hens, educational pam-phlets are being mailed out under he heading "Eggs for Britain." Already Canada has shipped to he British Food Ministry this ear 284,000 cases of eggs and vaiting to move overseas are 230,-100 cases which have been paid . This means that by early fall ritons will have been supplied year with 185,540,000 eggs. The British Food Ministry has adicated it will need four to five imes this number of eggs in the ine-month period following Sep-





Three New British Warships To Be Put Into Service This

Three British super-battleships, the Jellicoe, Beattle and Duke of Fork will be put into service in the autumn, the BBC said recently.

The ships will be of the George V class, of which the Prince of Wales and the George V already

Observers in London believed that at least one of these units since Prime Minister Churchill, in his broadcast, spoke of the Prince of Wales as "almost the newest" British battleship. She had beer regarded hitherto as the newest The George V was disclosed to have been completed last winter when she suddenly arrived off the United States coast bringing Vis-count Halifax, then newly named ssador to Washington

Launched February 21, 1939, she displaces 35,000 tons, and is considered, with the Prince of Wales, to be the most up-to-date battle ship afloat. She has enhanced armor defence against air attack including an improved distribution of deck and side armor and an improved system of under-water pro-

The Prince of Wales first came into the news during the great hunt for the Bismarck, her guns pounding the giant Nazi battleship before the coup de grace was administered by torpedoes.

The Duke of York was launch
