Ottawa, September 16th. The week of Reconstruction has brought home to the rank and file of Canadians, as perhaps no other means could so adequately, the extent of the sacrifice and effort that must be made by the individual Canadian to ensure victory. That at least has been the object of the week set aside for proclamation of national and individual stock-taking. The war in Russia has given this country a start in the revelation of the power and resources of the enemy. The tenacity and gallantry of the resistance of Russia arouse pride and hope, but the stark struggle going on between Murnansk and Odessa has fully opened the eyes of the democracies to the immense forces that Hitler has unleashed and that must be smashed before victory is won. It is with this revelation before us and with the intimate knowledge gained by the prime minister on his recent visit to Britain of the real war situation and the extent of the dangers that confront the free world, that the government has made its urgent appeal to Canadians to throw their whole weight into the prosecution of the war. The speeches of public men have impressed on Canadians that the struggle that is in this hour of destiny, the spirit of genuine sacrifice and cooperation must inspire all civilians, that Canada needs all the men she can muster for her sea and air forces and that there must be thrift on everybody's part so that the country will have the finances which are the sinews of war. Canada's war industries have undoubtedly progressed very satisfactorily from the "standing start" at the opening of the war. A balance now sought between the needs of the forces in terms of equipment and the needs of the forces in terms of men. Closer trade bonds are being forged with Peru, Colombia and Ecuador. It has been estimated that about 750,000 wage earners now receive the bonus, including 150,000 railway workers, those engaged in the pulp and paper industry, coal miners in Nova Scotia and at Estevan in Saskatchewan, coal miners and shipyard workers in B.C. and gold miners in Northern Ontario, Quebec, and Manitoba.

A Real Achievement
It is an achievement, too, as these articles aim to tell, not just an 'effort' a word that falls to give the true emphasis. We would also add that not once throughout the entire eight-day pilgrimage was the word 'politics' heard. The men who were our hosts were far too intensely absorbed in the vital task of sharing Canada's tools of war to worry about the political side of the trip that these men, many of them, were doing a job for Canada, that they were sparring neither strength nor talent to perform that service, and that they were admirably fitted for the key posts which they occupied. The same applies to the industrial leaders, the military camp commanders, the chiefs of the navy and air force, with whom we came in contact. They have the impression of being on top of their job and they inspired confidence by their frank, alert and confident bearing. Many Canadian editors are resting now easily as a result of those contacts.

Not a Joy-Ride
Where did we go? What did we see? What did we learn in those eight days? If any reader has the impression that it was simply a joy-ride at government expense, we can only say that it was the most strenuous camp journey of those of those days. In and out of barracks, machine shops and airframes, through huge munitions factories, naval dockyards and arsenals. We were bounced over hill and dale in trucks, tractors, carriers, blitz buggies and many other of those frightening vehicles which form the mechanized and armored army of 1941. We saw not only nine horses remain in the Canadian army and they are headed for the glue factory. We were driven that penetrated to the marrow: we were ambushed and debauched until we loathed the sight of a bus; we were thumped by depth charges tossed from a destroyer on the broad Atlantic; we travelled some 3,000 miles by train and were finally disembarked in Montreal on a Sunday night in the midst of a downpour of rain. We forgave all except the sharp jolts of a heartless porter every morning at 6:30 a.m. Yes, a joy-ride indeed!

Highlights of the Tour
In concluding this initial article, just an outline of a few unforgettable highlights. There was the astonishing demonstration of tracked or armored fighting vehicles and wheeled passenger or load-carrying vehicles at the General Motors proving ground near Ottawa, featuring movement over the roughest ground in contact. 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and his staff. To many other places we journeyed, many new acquaintances made, and stirring stories heard. Here a man from Dunkirk, another from the sunken Fraser, who had just flown from England or another about to board a bomber for the Old Land, heroes of the Battle of Britain and men from London who had lived and worked through the blitz.
In succeeding articles we will try to tell the story of Canada's army, navy and air force, of the turning wheels and spinning lathes that are writing a new and glorious chapter for the Old Land, heroes of the revolutionize the Dominion's entire fall of France a little more than a year ago, a miracle has been wrought. White Canadians found that the keem brains of Canada's military and industrial leaders were working night and day to draft the blueprint of Canada's magnified war machine and to set in motion the wheels that would make her contribution to the Empire cause one of which every Canadian might rightly be proud.
