A. Cabbage sauce is excellent when served with broiled fish in place of the usual tartar sauce. It can be made by shredding finely head cabbage and mixing with chopped green peppers, 1 cup diced celery, 3 tablespoons chopped nuts, 1 cup boiled dressing, and 4 tablespoons chili sauce. Chill for several hours before serving.

HOW MUCH DOES GAS WEIGH?


