TO PAY YOUR 1941 Income Tax

on the Government Monthly Plan You must start at once!

Next Tuesday will be the last opportunity to pay your 1941 Income Tax on the Government Monthly Plan. This gives you the privilege of paying in twelve monthly installments without interest, instead of by lump sum in March, 1942. in March, 1942.

Here is how to get the monthly payment privilege!
Divide the total of your 1940 Income Tax by twelve.
This is your first payment — and must be paid to the Receiver General on or before September 30, 1941.
You will then pay the same amount before the end of each month for the balance of 1941. When you have estimated your 1941 income tax at the 1941 rate, you estimated your 1941 income tax at the 1941 rate, you will deduct the four payments you will have already made, and pay the remainder in eight equal monthly installments, starting January, 1942.

The Government offers the above plan as the most reasonable and convenient method of meeting income tax obligations. Ask your local Income Tax Office for Installment Income Tax Remittance Form — and any further information you may require.
