



OFFICE OF THE CHIEF PLEBISCITE OFFICER PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT

EVERY CANADIAN CITIZEN IS HEREBY ADVISED:

- (1) THAT a Proclamation of the Governor in Council dated the 9th day of March, 1942, ordered a plebiscite to be taken in every electoral district in Canada on the question set out in the ballot papers to be used thereat in the following words and form:

Vote by making a cross, thus **X**, after the word 'Yes' or after the word 'No'.

Are you in favour of releasing the government from any obligation arising out of any past commitments restricting the methods of raising men for military service?

- (2) THAT the date fixed as polling day for the said plebiscite is Monday, the 27th day of April, 1942.
- (3) THAT polls will be open in each polling division from 8 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock p.m. (daylight saving time).
- (4) THAT new lists of voters have been specially prepared for the said plebiscite.
- (5) THAT the said lists are what may be termed "open lists" which means that, in either urban or rural polling divisions, any qualified voter whose name has been omitted from same may vote on polling day in his polling division upon taking the required oath and upon being vouched for on oath by a voter whose name appears on the list of voters for such polling division.
- (6) THAT National Registration Certificates are required to be produced by qualified urban voters whose names have been omitted from the lists of voters, and by those voters only, before being allowed to vote.
- (7) THAT advance polls will be opened in the same localities and on the same conditions as at the last General Election.
- (8) THAT, as a general rule, every person who has ordinarily resided in Canada during the last twelve months is entitled to vote at the said plebiscite if he is twenty-one years of age and a British subject.
- (9) THAT voters will be entitled to vote in the polling division in which they were ordinarily residing on the 30th day of March last.
- (10) THAT urban voters have been advised of the location of their polling stations on the notices left at their dwelling places by the enumerators.
- (11) THAT rural voters have been notified in the Notice to Voters posted up in the post offices, and should have been verbally advised by the rural enumerators of the location of their polling stations.
- (12) THAT, generally, polling stations for the said plebiscite will be established at or near the same premises as at the last General Election.
- (13) THAT arrangements are being made to collect the results of the plebiscite on the evening of polling day as is done at a General Election.
- (14) THAT every Canadian on active service or in training in any of His Majesty's forces or corps, within or without Canada, is entitled to vote at the plebiscite in advance of polling day by virtue of a special procedure provided.

ASKS CITY WORKERS AID FARM HARVEST

Hon. P. M. Dewar, Requests Boards of Trade, Service Clubs, Town and City Councils to Organize Volunteer Men Power for Farms During Harvest Week.

There is every indication that Ontario farmers will urgently require organized help from cities, towns and villages at harvest time if wartime tools are to be kept constantly moving to the United Kingdom, states Hon. P. M. Dewar, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, in voicing a plea to all urban centres for an official organization of man power during the rush of hay, grain and corn harvests to aid hard-pressed and over-worked farmers.

Country farm surveys said the Minister, show that farmers feel they must crop every possible acre to keep Canada and Britain provided with wholesome war foods. During the next few weeks farmers will be working long hours at high pressure to get seed into the ground. Harvesting this crop is a national problem which it is probable can be met only by adequate help from cities and towns.

Mr. Dewar pointed out that a number of urban centres had already formed organizations to aid farmers with their crop. He requests that Boards of Trade, Service Clubs, town and city councils could take the lead and co-operate with other organizations in all centres. Volunteers can then register with their local organizations for harvest work on farms of friends or relatives, or go out in caravans of four or five to nearby farms. Local organizations already formed are co-operating with the farm, army, navy, and cultural Representatives and Employment Agencies. Mr. Dewar declared the best form of efficiency, aid means just that to urban dwellers as to farmers; for unharvested crops are a waste of the spontaneous co-operation of a free people.

It is not for a moment suggested that a tractor owner neglect his own field but this column is an appeal to him to look around his neighbourhood for a greater number of days either on the home farm or neighbouring farms? If such a tractor owner there would be a much better chance of getting land for crops worked at the proper time with a consequent increase in production.

Jarvis District Will Have Opportunity to Hear Outstanding Speaker

The Jarvis Group Women's Institute in co-operation with the Y.W.C.A. Hostess, Mrs. Cowell, and the Chaplain F.H. Rev. Linton, of Jarvis B. and G. School is sponsoring a meeting to be held in Knox Presbyterian Church, Jarvis on Tuesday, May 12th at 7:30 P.M. at which Dr. Charlotte Whitton, C.B.E., will be guest speaker. She has been chosen as her subject "Woman's Place in a Changing World." and it is felt that no one should miss this treat.

Dr. Whitton is Canada's delegate to the League of Nations and is the committee for Child Protection and she was consultant to the Dominion Authorities on the movement of overseas children to Canada. She was at one time secretary to Canada's Minister of Trade and Commerce, is editor of Canadian Welfare Magazine and is on the National Executive of the I.O.O.F. and also on the National Executive of the Social Service Council of the Church of England in Canada. She was made a Commander of the order of the British Empire by his late Majesty King George V and received from that monarch the Jubilee Medal for public service. Dr. Whitton is still regarded as a Jarvis boy. Before returning to Canada he commanded the 112th R.C.A.F. Army Co-operation Squadron overseas.

Dr. Whitton is at present on a five week's lecture tour in the United States and will stop at Jarvis on her way back to Ottawa.

Jarvis Voters Say Yes Emphatically

Slightly More Than Fifty Percent of Voters Cast Ballots

Only 220 of a possible 440 ballots were cast in the Village on Monday, as the voters gave an emphatic "Yes" to the plebiscite question. Of the 220 votes cast, 116 were in the affirmative. It was plainly evident in this district that little enthusiasm was aroused by the question. The vote was a straight conception question, and ladies particularly were hesitating to vote "Yes" with the idea it would probably mean sending some one's son to war. Others refused to cast a ballot on that account. Others were entirely indifferent to the matter.

The vote in Jarvis was almost one to one in the affirmative. In the County this ratio was reduced to almost five to one in the affirmative. Out of a total of 672 ballots cast in Haldimand, 5300 votes were yes. The 672 votes on Monday compared with more than 35,000 in the last Federal election.

Caledonia Boy Gives His Life

Sgt. C. A. Parke, R.C.A.F., First Casualty of That District

Caledonia, April 27 — A deep gloom was cast over the nearby Unity block of Seneca township and Caledonia today, following cable advice from overseas to Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Parke last night that their son, Sgt. C. Arthur Parke had lost his life on active service April 25. He was the first Caledonia boy reported killed on active service. Born in Seneca township, he was a young man of sterling character, a member of Unity United Church and Sunday School, and a former Caledonia high school student. He attended the Caledonia agricultural short course and later took a special course in poultry work at the Ontario Agricultural College in Guelph. He enlisted at Hamilton in July, 1940, and was stationed at Toronto, Montreal, Yarmouth, N.S., and Fingert. On graduating as a wireless gunner, he went overseas in June, 1941. In January of this year he was married to Miss Isabel Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Johnson, of London, England. He was 26 years of age.

He is survived by his parents, one brother, Wilfred F. Parke, and one sister, Miss Margaret J. Parke, of Hamilton.

On The Farm Front

The half year mark in the 1941-1942 bacon agreement was passed early this month. During that 36 week period a total of 326 million pounds of the 600 million contract had been purchased. This leaves 274 million pounds to be purchased between now and early October. Without going into detail it will be necessary to have an increase of slightly over 25 per cent in the production of bacon and pork products during the next six months as compared with the same period last year.

The great problem is whether or not we can do it especially in view of the fact that the increase in inspected slaughtering for the past six months has been only 4.2 per cent greater than those for the first half of the 1940-1941 agreement.

Frankly speaking there is little we can do now by way of increasing the number of pigs to be marketed before October 1st. They have all been born and nothing remains but for us as farmers to do our best with what we have. As we see it there are two things in particular to be done: 1st - Save every pig possible and prevent losses from disease and parasites; 2nd - Market all hogs at the maximum weight that will still yield a grade A carcass.

Both of these factors are in our own hands and require the application of sound judgment and proven practices of feeding and management. "Prevention is better than cure" so the old adage ran and the axiom is as true now as at any time. Proper preventive measures will in a very large degree take care of the first factor. A little care and the use of a scale should make it possible to get hogs to market at the proper weights.

All of which again raises the question of what is the proper weight. Generally speaking pigs weighing from 190 to 220 pounds are in the right weights and in practice a good rule to follow has been the marketing of hogs at 200 to 210 lbs. (continued on page eight)
