JACOB'S VISION OF GOD -Genesis 27, 28. PRINTED TEXT, Genesis 28: 10-22. GOLDEN TEXT.—I am with

thee, and will keep thee whither-soever thou goest. Genesis 28:15. THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING Time .- This event can be dated somewhere near 1760 B.C. Place.—The beginning of ou story is laid in Beer-sheba, in southern Palestine, but the dream of Jacob takes place at Bethel twelve miles north of Jerusalem


