A VALUABLE INSTITUTION

I made one of my spasmodic visits to the Jarvis Public Library the other night and discovered I was delinquent with my dues. Not a very serious offense, probably. In fact I would probably never even be reminded, that I failed to subscribe the annual fee set by the Library Board.

I wonder how many hundred books there are in The Jarvis Public Library; are how many hours of restful, educative reading, enjoyed by the people of the Jarvis Community? — and how many people have stopped to think very much about it all? Very few, except the little handful of people who devote their services to the Library Board, we venture to say.

It is very seldom anything is ever

heard about these people who keep the Library going. I don't know a great deal about their duties, but must be their responsibility to select the new books brought in — and that in itself is a job that must be difficult. Then there are the ladies who give their services during the hours the Library is open twice a week. As nearly as I can recollect the same group has been giving their services to the Library for many years.

It seems to me, therefore, that the least the rest of us can do, as citizens of the community, is to make sure that our annual fee of \$1.00 is paid regularly. Whether we read books from the Library or not, as citizens, we should have sufficient interest in one of our most valuable institutions, to subscribe \$1.00 per year toward its maintenance. If we would all do just that for the year 1943, I feel sure that gallant band who have devoted themselves for years in maintaining the Library would feel in at least a small measure assured that their efforts have not been in vain.

A TOUGH SITUATION

Readers like myself, who on occasion find themselves passing the main corner of the Village in the early morning hours, will undoubtedly have noticed there are always Airman waiting there for rides to the Training School.

During the balmy summer and early Fall evenings this situation could be assumed without any great pang of conscience. But to pass these men when the thermometer is registering near zero, and knowing it is only a matter of minutes until you will be under warm blankets, is quite another thing. These men, I am informed from an authoritative source, sometimes wait for two or three hours for a ride and finally set out to walk the six miles into the School. That is a tough situation to be in, when you are giving your services to your country.

OVERSEAS MAIL DAMAGED

The Postal Department reports that 7,041 bags of Christmas mail for the armed forces overseas had been extensively damaged — partly destroyed — by fire aboard a ship at an Eastern Canadian port, and an appeal is made not to send inflammable substances through the mails. The department said postal authorities have arranged for men to separate the damaged and water-soaked mail. But Christmas mail is so important to some men in the forces because this mail cannot possibly get there in time for Christmas.

MacPherson is not a Messiah, merely a Scot who was born on Cape Breton Island. He can sit up all night arguing and tire out a half dozen normal men, even though he never uses anything stronger than tea to keep him going. Lately the Liberals have cut down on his tea, but he is still trying to participate only modestly in this war, while that hope someone else will win it for them.

FOR A TAXLESS PROSPERITY

When the Conservative Party convenes at Winnipeg this month, it is hoped that the leader-choosers and public writers will recognize that there are many people in this country who are not selfish. If the Conservative Party adds to the crowd on the left, the anti-radical element in Canada will remain inarticulate. It was shown as recently as 1939 that Canadians will vote Conservative in sufficient numbers to elect a Government.
