MILK PRICE REDUCTIONS

Ottawa, Dec. 16 - Further details of the new plan reducing prices of milk to consumers by two cents a quart, effective December 16, were announced during the past week by the Wartime Price and Trade Board. Making clear a number of points on which there had been uncertainty, particularly among milk producers, it is emphasized that the plan does not in any way affect the prices received by farmers for milk they deliver to distributors. The reduction applies only to retail sales, and must be made by all classes of distributor, large and small including the farmer who has a little milk route of his own. Anyone who sells milk to consumers is required by law to reduce the price to his customer by two cents a quart or one cent a pint. The reduction applies to every part of Canada, no matter what the previous price has been.

Through the payment of a Government subsidy, all these distributors will be given a refund of the two cents per quart, and arrangements have been made with the chartered banks of Canada to pay out these refunds through their branches at stated periods. The first refund payment will be made at the end of December. Milk distributors should keep a detailed record of their sales each day. On December 30 forms will be available at local banks on which they will fill out the record of their sales to that date. The banks are authorized to pay then the money due for the first two-week period, December 16 to 31. After that, refunds will be made by the banks to distributors at the end of each calendar month. Board officials emphasize that the forms referred to will not be available at any bank until December 30, but after that date will be available at any time, though refunds will be paid only at the end of each calendar month, on sales made during that month.

Distributors who do not deal with any particular bank at present are advised to select one with which they wish to deal in connection with their milk refunds, and to continue to deal with the same bank hereafter in this matter, so that records may be kept in order. A Board order issued during the past week, giving effect to the plan, makes clear that it applies to all classes of milk, including cultured and flavored dairy drinks. Sales of chocolate milk or other such drinks by the glass at lunch counters and such places are not effected.

STRETCH BUTTER WITH OTHER FAT FOR WINTER USE Various Substitutes and Dilutions Advised to Ease Out Scarce Article of Food.

Making the best use of butter and other scarce fats is a nutritional and thrift-cooking "must" for housewives this winter. Fats are very important in the diet as a source of energy. They also give flavor, richness and a staying quality to the city's meals. If you are short on butter, remember that kitchen fats such as poultry fats and those trimmed from raw meat can serve as energy substitutes. The fat collected after stewed chicken and stock has cooled is delicious in place of other fat for sauce or biscuit or pot pie covering. Cold chicken fat can be put into molasses, chocolate or spice cake to substitute for other shortening.

Good Drippings Drippings from roasts and other cooked meats make flavorful fats for seasoning. In place of that big piece of butter on top of hot meat as it goes tableward, use the hot drippings. You can also use the drippings in gravies, for seasoning vegetables, in salad, dressings and on waffles and hot biscuits. Or in ways that best suit your family. Clear fat taken from raw meat and cut into small pieces is an excellent shortening for pastry, biscuits and other quick breads. It is also good for browning foods and this saves a lot of butter or margarine. Diluted Butter You can stretch your butter supply and please the budget by using half butter and half other fats in cake, cookie or pudding recipe calling for all butter and you will still have enough butter to give the desired flavor. Try using other fat as a seasoning for french fries, or as a top glaze for fluffy mashed potatoes and as sauce for cold rice. It is also good for the fat called for in savory cheese sauce put over boiled rice or macaroni to be baked. To save your precious supply of butter, keep it wrapped or in a covered jar and set in the coldest part of the refrigerator. Cut off just en-

(continued from page one) placed in the bottom of the box. Another item in the saving of little pigs is the placing of a guard rail around the pen about 6 or 8 inches from the floor and the same distance from the wall. Be sure to have it low enough to prevent the sow from pushing underneath. This will save a good many little pigs from smothering. The removal of black teeth before the pigs are 48 hours old is also a good practice.

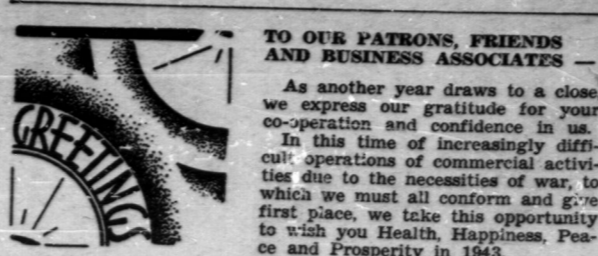

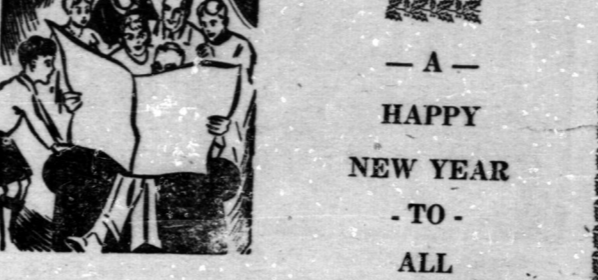
ough butter needed for cooking or the table. If butter has softened on a plate, set in refrigerator until it hardens. There will be less waste as it is scraped off hard and used later. You can reduce amount of butter called for in recipes also calling for cheese and chocolate as they too are high in fat. Remember that all fats are perishable. Keep them in a very cold place and use up within a reasonable length of time to keep them from getting rancid.

THE WEEK IN OTTAWA

(continued from page one) Canada at the behest of Selection Service authorities. The report, as yet unconfirmed by governmental sources, says that such compulsory transfers of labor have been approved by the Selective Service Advisory Committee. If such approval has been given, it appears that farmers, though not specifically mentioned so far, will have at least a small pool of labor upon which to draw. Not all reworked, but some at least, should be capable of undertaking the lighter kinds of agricultural labor. It is understood that proposals looking to the transfer of labor have yet to be considered by the cabinet's manpower committee. Fighting Men Canada's maritime provinces share the distinction of contributing more men to the fighting services in proportion to populations than any other part of Canada. Enlistment figures for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island show that 41.5 per cent of their total eligible male population is in the forces, and that 37.5 per cent has volunteered for service anywhere. New Brunswick has 39 per cent of its eligible population in uniform. Of these servicemen, 33 per cent volunteered for service anywhere. (Copyright, 1942, by the Canadian Press.)
