But how many have considered indoor pictures in the daytime, using a combination of daylight and artificial illumination? Just choose a well lighted window as a background for some of your child pictures or informal portrait studies—use one or two amateur flood lamps to illuminate the shadows, and you'll get shots with unusual quality and appeal.

The window, in these shots, provides a background with unusually bright, luminous quality. For maximum delicacy of effect, choose a large window with white or ivory framework that faces a white house or open sizy. Fither a dull or sunny day will be suitable for your pictures, depending upon the effect you desire.

By omitting artificial light, or varying its quantity and the distance from the subject, you can obtain any effect from a silhouette to full lighting. For the latter, the usual combination of two amateur flood lamps may be used at the
