**Air Chief Praises New Canadian Plane**

Operational flights of a new airplane, now being built in Canada, as well as in England, show in more than any aircraft present.

Soviet losses in the first year of the war, were likewise far greater than the number of German aircraft lost.

The excess profits tax on corporations is being increased from 15 to 20 per cent, effective July 1st. In essence this means that with revenue, income and corporation tax paid, the excess profits tax will be imposed at 25 per cent.
