Council Pare Estimates in **Endeavour to Hold Tax**

t their July meeting on Friday night which was postponed from the pre-vious Tuesday. The tax rate was finally set at 42 mills, which with the one mill subsidy from the Proincial Government will make a net rate of 41 mills. This represents an increase of a half mill over 1941. increase of a half mill over 1941.
