Finally, something practical is proposed to be done to help the farmers of Ontario in their vital task of producing in war times. The labor shortage is to be tackled in a business, rather than a holiday, fashion. Mechanicai equipment is to be pooled.

This prospect emerges from an announcement by Hon J. M. Dewan, Minister of Agriculture, that an agricultural war com-mittee is to be organized in each county of the province. Agricultural representatives have been at work on the formation of these These county committees will

mobilize the available labor; they will work out a scheme by which mechanical equipment, plentiful in some sections and comparatively scarce in others, is put fully to work. This phase of the farm problem is heightened by the probability that it will be difficult to buy new equipment. Full use of existing machines is Labor Problem

Work on the labor problem is particularly important. Announcement of the organization of the provincial county committees, which will deal with this problem, among others, is virtually coincident with federal plans to introduce domestic service under he National Mobilization and Resources Act. County committees, working through the provincial government, will be able to relate their needs to the general program of selective service. In any event, just as they propose te keep mechanical aquipment moving out to points where it will be of the most good, they can also plan to see that farm labor is


