OUR WAY OF LIFE

When the great fortress of Singapore, the bastion of the British Empire in the Far East, fell to the soldiers of the Rising Sun, British prestige took an awful slump. And when the German squadron sailed up the Channel and thumbed their noses at John Bull, we felt that we were at the parting of the ways.

The little yellow men have shown the world what a poor nation can do if it is not united. Japan's horizons, strewn all along the Far Eastern horizon, which would indicate a supreme confidence in the maintenance of superiority in the air, and on land and sea. Their success is phenomenal. After ten years of the struggle in China, Japan now challenges the world, and it would appear to be a foolhardy venture to nature's resources but with a population that will work and fight. They are a poor nation, without natural resources but with a population that will work and fight.

It is often said that we want the truth. At that memorable conference at Jerusalem, Pilate asked, "What is the Truth?" Nothing is so dangerous as the truth, and the truth is that for twenty-five years we have been a morally, physically and culturally inferior race. The war effort is stalled. The future is full of foreboding. We are fighting a resourceful and efficient enemy who has brains and uses them.

Elsewhere in this issue will be found a news story relating to the distribution of several thousand trees for planting purposes throughout the county. The trees are secured from the Forestry Station at St. Williams and distributed to the various schools. Each pupil is given a definite number of trees to plant. This is a plan in which Haldimand County has taken the lead, and since the plan was inaugurated more than 100,000 trees have been planted in the County. It is also gratifying to note that W. S. Fould's Deputy Reeve, Mr. S. Fould is Chairman of the Undertaking.

The conservation of the Natural Resources of Ontario is beginning to be regarded as serious. Reforestation will help to offset the loss of trees and help to replace once again a greater available supply of water throughout the agricultural area. The plan to have these trees planted by school children is doubly beneficial. It will mean much to the future productivity of the soil, and those associated with it in years to come, will have an early appreciation of the necessity of reforestation.

An Oshawa Alderman suggests that those who refrain from voting be penalized, and that those who vote be paid a dollar. There are a lot of things of an uncomplimentary nature we can think of saying about people who fail to exercise their franchise, but any effort toward compulsion will be making a mockery of democracy.

While Canadians are allowed three quarters of a pound of sugar per person per week, this does not entitle housewives to create an accumulation of sugar from such purchases for canning. Special provision for canning will be made, according to an announcement from the W.P.F.T.S. One half pound of sugar for every pound of fruit and three quarters of a pound for jams and jellies will be made available during the canning season.

The knowledge of the fact that the Government is continuing the payment of a 50 cents per case subsidy on imported grapefruit juice, will not be entertained with appreciation by those farmers who now find the subsidy on manufactured and fluid milk cut off.

The Temperance Forces suffered a setback in the closing of the Halifax Seaman's Club (AJAX). Nothing was accomplished as the Federal Government will shortly open a new club for the men of the sea, with all privileges of the W.P.F.T.S. The nature of the club is not to be a source of temptation as the Windsor Daily Star states vent to his feelings as follows: "It is a formidable army against the closing of the Ajax Club in Halifax, at the behest of a handful of sourpusses whose Church is across the street. The mention of this column previously, we've visited the Ajax Club and are in a position to appreciate what it has done for the men without whose heroism we'd be Hitler's slaves today. The Hitler-thanks over the way have induced the Nova Scotia government to cancel the Ajax beer license, thus driving members into the hands of bootleggers and developers. Temperance, what crimes are committed in thy name?"

Church Notes

AT THE UNITED CHURCH Mother's Day will be celebrated in Waterford with a special service at 11 o'clock when the Children's Choir will furnish the leadership in the praise and sing a specially prepared Anthem of Thanksgiving for mother's sacrifices in our day of war. Various adult and junior members of the Sunday School will take part in the service and the minors will give a short address on "God, who dwells in the solitaire in families." The Superintendent, Mr. D. J. Deller will preside.

In the 7:30 service of worship the mother's choir will lead. Pictures on India will be presented at 8:10 with commentary by the minister. The offering will be for the "Flower Fund" which the Bible Class administers. There are fifty colored sashes kindly lent by Mr. Lorne Johnson of Hamilton.

The Young People's Union was able to report \$184.00 received or promised for the Lent to your country and give to your church fund. They hope to double this amount before September when the fund will close. By means of this fund it is confidently hoped to liquidate a deficit of \$1,000.00 which had accumulated chiefly in carrying on home mission work in the West during seven years of drought, crop failure and depression. More than this amount is already underwritten. All contributions are invested in War Bonds, Certificates or stamps, and in seven and one-half years will return 20 per cent increase.

Thousands of women are working in the 2600 branches of the Canadian Red Cross Society all across Canada to keep up the production of comforts and clothing and hospital supplies for the relief of human suffering. Last year 6,818,804 articles poured into Red Cross warehouses from these busy branches, including hospital supplies totalling 1,966,353; comforts for the Armed Forces and Women's Auxiliary Services 6,818,272; comforts distributed in Canada and overseas 409,228 and civilian clothing and comforts for shipment overseas 2,239,821.

Care is being taken by the purchasing committee coupled with the generosity of the merchants and the volunteer work of devoted women all over the Dominion has meant an ever increasing supply of relief articles. The Canadian Red Cross has not been idle. A nation-wide drive opened May 11th, has become a necessity to raise the \$9,000,000 required to face the still greater task ahead. The Red Cross must be ready to open its doors on called notices for an emergency on the home front. The continuous distribution of comforts, hospital supplies and clothing must go on apace.
