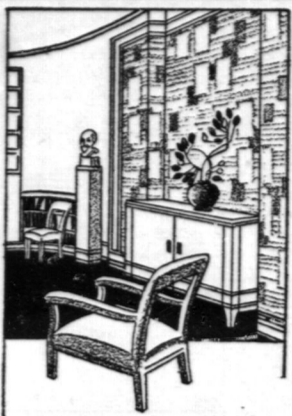

LESS SUGAR THE BETTER

Canadian sugar rations of three-quarters of a pound are not severe enough to make skimping necessary in the average household, but they have the effect, we think, of making the average person less extravagant. And quite apart from the war need for reduced consumption, less sugaring is apparently a beneficial factor in improving the health of the nation.

In Canada the sugar season runs from the time of cane and beet sugar, both brown and white. In the U.S. only white sugar is rationed and it is to be sold only upon presentation of a ration card. As the American citizen prepared for this first experiment with wartime food rationing, Time magazine offered some encouraging thoughts for those with a sweet-tooth.

Doctors, dentists dietitians say time and time again that Americans have been eating too much sugar anyway, and that even if sugar were eliminated entirely citizens would probably be healthier than they are now. White sugar, though purest, is the poorest from a nutritional point of view. And the present per capita consumption in the U.S. is ten times what it was less than 100 years ago.

Brown sugar, (rationed in Canada) is a mixture of molasses and sugar, and provides plenty of sugar and vital minerals as well. Fruits most of which are rich in sugar also supply vitamins. By getting sugar in these forms it is suggested that the rationing problem of sugar and citizens get greater food value. It is also noted that saccharine is not a substitute for sugar, and that its use is not only unwholesome but may be harmful in quantity.

Controlled researches Time continues, say that excessive sugar consumption accounts for the fact that tooth decay is the most common disease. Fruit can satisfy the craving for something sweet and the chemistry of the sugars the body uses is automatically converted the starch of bread, potatoes, corn and other foods to the sugars the body needs.

It is only recently that sugar has been regarded as a food. For most of its history the sugar which was brought to Europe until Arabs brought their "sweet" to Spain, and from there to the rest of the world. And for centuries afterwards it was regarded as a rare spice, a medicine or a rich man's luxury.

ON THE FARM FRONT

Millet is another crop that may be grown either in rows or in a broadcast sowing during the first half of June on well prepared soil at 20 to 30 pounds per acre. The crop may be pastured when it is about a foot high or cut for hay when it is about two feet high. Millet is particularly high in feeding value when it produces a large amount of roughage.

Care should be taken to prevent bloating when animals are fed green lucerne, annual pasture especially if it is wet or frozen. The production of gas in the rumen is gradual. Animals should not be changed from one feed to another until they are turned in and should be left to eat a short time at first. They should have access to some dry feed if possible.

Egg quality must be considered if we are to meet Britain's war needs. Quality is never better than when the egg is laid. As producers it is our duty to maintain that quality. How can it be best? The following are a few simple hints:

- 1st—Gather eggs at least twice daily either in hot weather. 2nd—Collect in clean, rigid baskets. 3rd—Place in clean egg room free from foul or musty odours. 4th—Do not allow broody hens to remain in nests. 5th—Cool as rapidly as possible to a temperature below 68 degrees. 6th—Market eggs as quickly as possible.

Two more eggs per month from every farm hen is the objective to be reached. In Haldimand County alone this will mean a total increase in production of over 1600 cases of 30 dozen each per month! Such an increase demands eternal vigilance on the part of every producer to see that nothing goes wrong. Parasites must be maintained, parasites must be controlled. Hoppers must be kept off. Be sure to supply plenty of clean drinking water at all times. Stop the spread of disease before it gets started.

The use of feeders for pigs is looked upon with favour as it is a saving device in the production of commercial hogs. The amount of feed used is determined by the kind of feed used and the power of observation of the owner. Properly balanced rations must be used if such growing pigs to be successful. Young hogs are to be shown carefully. The farmer must watch his pigs very carefully to determine the progress being made. For determining finishing hogs self feeding is generally quite satisfactory.

A new self feeder for hogs has been developed by the O.A.C. This construction. The feeder is built in a platform 6 feet by 10 feet and may be moved about with a team or tractor. Blueprints of this feeder and a bill of material and details of construction can be had on application to the Department of Agriculture at Cayuga.
