ON THE FARM FRONT

An excellent booklet entitled "Handbook on Milk Production" is still available on application to the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. It contains a wealth of valuable information and is one of the most complete of its kind ever issued by the Department of Agriculture. It provides the answer to almost every question a farmer might ask on the feeding and management of a dairy herd throughout the entire year.

High quality butter can only be produced from high quality cream. A creamery man cannot make a good product from a poor cream. "External Cleanliness is the Price of Success in Dairying" is an old adage but it applies now as much as ever it did.

The following stores are essential in the production of high quality cream:
1. Milk udders and flanks of cows
2. Wine udders and flanks before milking
3. Milk with clean hands every time
4. Wash and scald milk pails regularly
5. Wash and scald separator parts after each using
6. Set separator to skim 30 to 35 per cent cream
7. Cool cream immediately to 55° F.
8. Hold cream at 50° F. provided the cleanest conditions for storage.

The wild plum and cherry trees were in blossom earlier than usual this year as were most of the domestic trees.

The cut-worm is another pest which makes its unwelcome appearance every year. It is a small, grub-like creature which has given the best results in many years. Molasses was used in the traps but it is not valuable for this purpose this year. The following proportions should be followed: Bran, 20 pounds; paraffin, 1 pound; water, about 2 1/2 gallons. Mix the bran and paraffin thoroughly and add the water to make it crumbly.

The bait should be spread around in the evening just before dusk. A warm still night is the most suitable. The rate of application is about 15 to 20 pounds per acre. In the case of land that has been heavily infested in 1941 treatment should be given before the plants are set out. One application should be sufficient, but if necessary a second may be given a few days later. In cases where the attack is unexpected the bait should be spread around the base of the plants using about a half teaspoon per plant. Keep the soil moist and water at this is a deadly poison.

REDUCTION OF SUGAR CAN BE PAINLESS
Sugar rationing won't hurt anyone. According to nutritionists, sugar does nothing more than supply extra energy and create an appetite for more sugar.

Here are "painless" ways to cut down on sugar:
Gradually reduce amounts in tea, coffee and cereals.
Milk is better than or eliminate entirely.
Serve fruits in season in their natural state instead of cakes, pies and puddings.

When stewing fruit, add sugar towards the end of the cooking period when it takes less to sweeten. A little vinegar will bring out the flavor. Avoid using soda as this destroys vitamin C.
Substitute honey, corn syrup, maple products or molasses when available. Remember if you have to buy them, you have to pay for them. Buy more of the dry kind, such as raisins, figs, prunes, dates, figs, etc.
Use vegetable, milk, eggs, cheese Canada Approved flour. When the natural food flavors, they will in all likelihood prefer it.
If dried fruits are used in muffins or cookies the amount of sugar called for in the recipe may be cut down.

On the Farm Front

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER
— By Haldimand Harry —
Sheep dipping time will soon be rolling around and Haldimand flock owners are reminded of the importance of doing this work particularly as a war-time practice. Every effort should be made to improve and increase the wool production and now is a good time to start thinking about the 1943 crop. It is generally agreed that dipping improves both the quality and quantity of the wool clip. Sheep that are free from ticks and lice are more easily kept in good condition. It is estimated that the saving in feed and the increase in the weight of the lamb and wool crop may easily amount to from 50 cents to \$1.00 per ewe. The cost of dipping is but a fraction of this, often being as low as 3 cents per head. Flock owners who have been in the habit of using powder dip are warned that while supplies of materials are ample this year it is unlikely any more will be imported until the war is over. The authorities in Great Britain have placed an embargo on this product. It would be well to make sure of dipping this year. Haldimand hog producers are continuing to hold their lead in the production of top grade carcasses. The most recent figures for the month of February of this year are 2084 pigs were marketed of which 1030 or 49.42 per cent, were grade A. Of the larger hog producing counties Peterborough was next with 43.33% grade A and Halton a close third with 42.29%. The latter's leading counties were Wentworth with 42.88% and Waterloo with 42.26%.

Cream Cans for Cream Only

A recent order-in-council makes it an offence to use a milk can to send out or use a can belonging to another creamery. Furthermore, it is an offence to use a milk or cream can for any other purpose than to carry cream to the consumer. A milk can, or to withhold a milk or cream can in your possession for any purpose other than that intended for its use. It is not necessary to turn in a purchased and owned by the farmer, although it would be in the interests of the country if such cans were sold to other farmers requiring containers or sent during the flush production periods.
