There are various year-round ways of stretching the sugar ration, at the same time keeping monotony out of the wartime menu.

Rhubarb, now at its tender best, may be canned without sugar, and in this form will take less to sweeten when used in puddings and pies next the same time keeping monotony out of the wartime menu.

Here is the method recommended by the Consumer Section, Dominion Department of Agriculture:

Wash rhubarb thoroughly. Drain, Cut stalks in one-inch pieces. Do not peel. Place in preserving kettle, covering with close-fitting lid. Set over low heat, or in the oven, until sufficient juice is extracted to cover the rhubarb, which takes about 20 minutes. Pour into sterilize djars, adjust rubbers and tops. Partially seal. Sterilize in a water bath for 16 minutes, or in the oven 20 minutes at 250F., then seal. Strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, cherries, currants, plums and rhubarb can be packed in jars, crushed until the juice overflows, then sterilized. (A strong spoon makes a good crusher). In sterilizing allow five minutes longer than the time required when syrup is added. Fruit put down in this way is excellent for pies and puddings.

Holstein-Friesian breeders of the counties of Haldimand, Norfolk and Lincoln and Welland are co-operating counties of Haldimand, Norfolk and Lincoln and Welland are co-operating to donate a high class purebred Holstein heifer calf to the War Effort Calf Auction to be held in conjunction with the National Holstein Sale at Brampton, Ont., on May 27. Last year, through the sale of calves and donations, Canadian Holstein breeders raised \$11.986.06, which was sent to England and used chiefly for ship-wrecked mariners relief funds. The gross receipts from the sale of the 15 calves being donated by the County Holstein Clubs in Ontario this year will be used for the same purpose. The calf to represent the breeders of this district was selected in the herd of Mr. C. C. Haviland, Wilsonville, Ont. Born in March of this year, this is the youngest heifer in the sale, but, at the same time is backed by the highest production records, her dam having a twice-a-day milking record of 21,114 bbs. milk and 758 bbs. fat. Her sire Braeside, Sir Abbekerk Posch is a son of Mr. Havil and's very famous old cow, Wonderland Toitilla Lady, that was grand champion at the 1936 C.N.E., first in milk at the 1939 C.N.E. when almost 12 years old and with a twice-a-day milking record of 24,522 lbs. milk and 902 bbs. fat.

C. D. Graham, chief of Ontario Holstein extension service and secretary of the war effort calf auction committee, states that this heifer offers an outstanding opportunity for a new breeder to purchase great fou ndation bloodlines for his herd and at the same time take active part in a most worthy patriotic venture.

# REGISTRATION UNEMPLOYED MEN

### WHO MUST REGISTER

Every man between the ages of 16 and 69 who is unemployed or who will not be gainfully occupied after May 31, 1942, must register. The following are excepted: Full-time students, or those confined in an asylum, or a prison, or hospital or home for the aged and infirm, or are subject to the provisions of the Essential Work (Scientific and Technical Personnel) Regulations, 1942.

If you have not already registered at an Employment and Claims Office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission within the last two weeks, or have not obtained work, you are required to register within the week of June 1st, 1942, or within one week after be-
