PARAGRAPH FOUR OF THE POWER CONTROLLERS ORDER READS

"4. PROHIBITED SUPPLY OF ELECTRICITY

No supplier shall supply electricity for any purpose to any person who to the knowledge of such supplier uses electricity contrary to the provisions of this order.

YOU WILL NOTE FROM THE ABOVE PARAGRAPH THAT YOUR LOCAL HYDRO COMMISSION ARE EQUALLY RESPONSIBLE WITH YOU IN SEEING THAT THE ORDERS OF THE POWER CONTROLLER ARE COMPLIED WITH.

THE PENALTY:

for failure to carry out these orders, is a fine not exceeding \$500, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months, or both.

Locally, it can generally be said there has been excellent co-operation on the part of consumers in complying with the orders of the Power Controller, HOWEVER—

Here Are a Few Reminders That Must Be Strictly Enforced

No person shall use electricity for the operation in any power shortage area of lighting or electrical equipment or installation for—

- (1) Interior or exterior sign lighting, whether commercial or non-commercial, but not including direction signs in stores and signs at the office or residence of a medical practitioner.
- (2) Interior or exterior show window and show case lighting but not including stock wardrobes.
- (3) Interior or exterior outline or ornamental lighting.
- (4) Interior or exterior lighting for decorative or advertising purposes.
- (5) Outdoor lighting and floodlighting.

ers in so far as quality is concerned but more pigs are needed and need very badly. There seems to be an abundance of coarse grain at reasonable prices. All of which calls for a steady increase in the number of sows being bred and the number of hogs to be marketed.

No one is suggesting for a moment that we plunge into this business in a big way and then plunge out of it just as quickly. Any increase should be gradual and steady. It is admitted, that price continues to be a factor but it has been pretty well demonstrated that given a hog of the right breeding and with good average conditions money can be made with pigs at 14c or 15c. A few years back these prices would have looked mighty attractive.

We have not heard of anyone having trouble with damp grain but with the catchy weather during threshing time it is possible there are a few. We recently heard of a John Clark, Manager of Grove Farm, Brantford. He puts approximately 2% of feed grain in the bin and then places a layer of bricks on top of the grain about three inches apart each way. Then another 2% of grain is placed on top of the bricks and so on. The bricks absorb the moisture and keep the grain from molding. This seems to be a general practice in the British Isles where there is much damp weather.

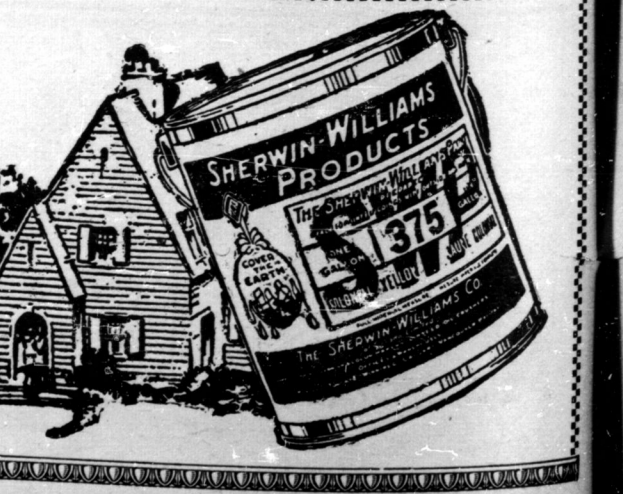

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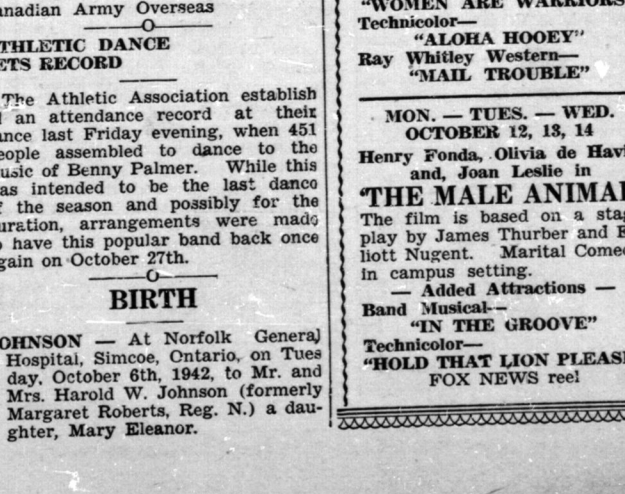

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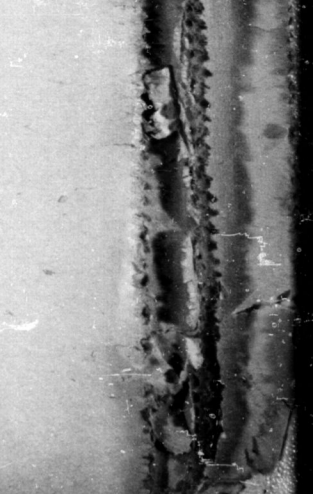
