CANADA'S AMAZING WAR EFFORT

Buffalo Evening News Editorial: With a population less by 2,000,000 than the people in New York State alone, the gallant Canadians just across the river is making a tremendous war effort that not only will be remembered for generations, but is playing an effective part right now in beating Hitler. Historians will write it down that when the Allies were safely hard up for arms, Canada sent them; when Britain was threatened with hunger, Canada sent food in huge supply.

In a brief three years Canada's Army has leaped from 4000 to more than 350,000 men, and when the force for the Dieppe raid was picked, they were mainly Canadians, 5000 of them, and every account reports that they fought like heroes.

Two thousand men of the Winnipeg Grenadiers and the Royal Rifles of Canada fought at Hong Kong.

When war struck the Canadian Navy had only six actual fighting ships and a half a dozen other boats, mainly mine-sweepers, with a total strength of 1800 men. Today it has over 300 ships, 30 times the original strength, more than 40,000 men, a 25-fold growth.

Other day the Canadian Navy minister revealed that the Canadian Navy has sunk four U-boats, probably sunk two more, and taken part in many other operations while losing only one patrol ship and a corvette.

Perhaps most remarkable of all Canada, from a nucleus of fewer than 5000 officers and airmen, had created an air force of more than 115,000, and has nearly 25 fully operational squadrons in Britain, riding German bases and cities, not to mention the squadrons sent to Egypt and the Colonies, the ones defending the home islands, and those fighting at long range U.S. forces in Alaska.

Zero practically represented Canadian aircraft industry in 1939. Now 400 planes a month roll off the lines. Big and little guns, ships, merchant and naval, armored cars and trucks, and tanks, all are now turning out in quantity in our sister nation across the English Bridge. The tanks are so complete and ready for service that some have actually gone into action in Russia. In time of war, "enough" is not enough. Next year Canada promises to do more!

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NOT BOMBS... Just dirty stove pipes

Make every member of your household a fire warden. Never before has the need for fire prevention been so urgent. Remember that buildings are now next to impossible to replace—that your loss is the Nation's loss now.
