More Men For Army

Another angle to the manpower shortage is that the army has issued a supplementary requisition for 6,505 men, who are being sought between October 12 and November 23. This is in addition to its requisition for 18,006 men who will be ordered to report between October 19 and November 13. The call for 6,505 men is a supplementary to the July requisition, which was for 15,000 men, and was taken as an indication that the calls issued in that month did for produce the number of men required.

A new policy to deal with the vexatious problem of beef shortages was announced by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. 
