18 Tank Cars Demolished In Freight Train Derailment

Flames Spread Across Field and Threaten Farm Buildings

TRAFFIC REROUTED OVER M.C.R. LINES

In one of the worst railway accidents in this area in many years, 18 tank cars loaded with gasoline and crude oil, went up in flames early Tuesday morning, five miles east of Jarvis on the C.N.R. line. While the cause of the accident has not been determined, it was thought that a truck on one of the air brakes to take hold, and thereby telescoping the cars coming behind. Eighteen cars left the track before the train came to a halt. The cars, leaving the track were several cars ahead away. Apparently fire started immediately, and shortly after one of the tank cars containing gasoline exploded, showering the gasoline completely across one field and filling the ditches.

Joseph Peery, who lives nearby, apparently was the first one to notice the fire. He called the Jarvis Fire Department, who were shortly on the scene. A crew from No. 1 Bombing and Gunnery School, was also dispatched when fires discovered the accident. The firemen, the Airman, assisted by nearby neighbors, regardless of personal danger, moved the loaded tank cars along the right-of-way. In the accident one of the tank cars was overturned, and the fire was extinguished. The firemen, who were moved out of danger, first Chief W. J. Elliott, who directed the operations, paid tribute to the men of the Jarvis Fire Department, who, he said, labored courageously, without thought of self, to save the precious gasoline and oil, and the home and buildings of Edward Start, and when the flames were threatened. Those on the scene said that it was impossible to remain as close to the fire as the

Animal Statistics
Latest figures for Haldimand County show a very small increase in the number of cattle being kept in the county. Horses on the other hand have taken another slight drop. Swine 6 months and over which would include all the sows being kept for breeding purposes have increased approximately 25 per cent. The increase in sheep has not shown up yet.

Fewer Hogs Marked
Another very decided drop has taken place in our swine production. In the month of August, 1942, we had fewer hogs marked than in the month of August 1941. More amazing still is the fact that we sold fewer hogs this August than we did during August 1941.
