BRAZIL EXPECTED TO GIVE BIG AID TO ALLIED CAUSE  
Her Population About Four Times Canada's But Includes Strong Axis Nationalist Groups

Rio De Janeiro, Sept. 1 - (CP) — Brazil, the first South American country to declare war on the Axis (Japan excluded) is expected to lend material and moral aid of definite proportions to the Allied lineup.

This huge Portuguese speaking nation, biggest of the South American republics is approximately 3,022,387 square miles in area and a population of about 15,000,000. borders on Chile and Ecuador and has a coast line of almost 5,000 miles to guard.

Brazil's army consists of 100,000 regulars, with 200,000 reserves. Navy has two battleships, two cruisers, 11 destroyers and four submarines in addition to several smaller craft.

Brazil had a peacetime air force of 3,500 men, is rapidly expanding its force.

In 1914 - 18 Brazil entered the First Great War (only South American nation to do so) for the same reason it came into the present conflict: ruthless German submarine attacks on Brazilian vessels. Brazil's contribution consisted of a fleet detachment sent to European waters, a medical mission and a number of aviators. Biggest part was played on the food front.

Top Brazilian is President Getulio Vargas, definitely anti-Axis. Brazil's immediate problem is to keep a wary eye on strong Axis nationalist groups who have settled there. Bra- zil has about 4,000,000 residents of German or Italian extraction. 300,000 Japanese. The latter represent the largest Japanese minority planted anywhere in the world.
