Dear Mr. and Mrs. Parkinson:

London, Sept. 15 - (CP) - Temporary Surgeon-Lt. Jack Houghton, who, with his legs lashed against a table to keep him steady, performed an emergency appendectomy on a crew as the craft lurched and plunged in a gale, has been mentioned in dispatches for distinguished service.

The operation lasted 80 minutes and the patient, a 21-year-old signaller, made a complete recovery.

So fierce was the gale that none of the crew could see the signaller.

The destroyer kept him in the captain's cabin and a signal lamp provided the illumination.
