

Silk Court Suit Given to Museum

W. Edgar Cantelon, curator of the Eva Brook Donly Museum, reports the addition of many valuable gifts to the Norfolk Historieal Society. Among these is a silk court suit, beautifully embroidered with colourd silk thread, which was specially made for General Michael Bailey 105 years ago, and worn by him at the Coronation of Queen Victoria.
