





This disease is prac-tically unknown in the tropics or the countries where fresh fruits and vegetables are eaten in abunof room. Small things like car rots need about three inches be tween, beets about four, cor three sprouts to the hill. With fine seed much drudgery can be saved by sowing thinly in the first place. With flowers that are grown from seed, thinning is equally important. They must have room or they will grow spindly and break down probably in the first windstorm.

All perennial flowers, shrubs and trees are small when origi-nally planted, but in a few years it is amazing how much room they take up. The average person plants them far too close together ahrubs, far too close to the house or fences.

As a general rule, shrubs, trees and flowers should have half as and flowers should have hair as much room between as their mature height. This means at least two feet apart for peonies, three and a half feet for the ordinary spirea, and from twenty-five to fifty feet for the general run of Canadian hardwood trees.
