RADIO REPORTER BY REX FROST

Many radio fans who make a habit of listening in during the late evening, particularly between 11 o'clock and midnight will have noticed that the American networks, to a great extent, have discontinued dance music in favour of other types of entertainment. The National Broadcasting Company has been putting on quite an extensive series of dramatic plays, while the Columbia Broadcasting System has presented a number of programmes of symphonic music. Why the change? People have been asking whether it has been brought about as the result of representations from a growing group of listeners who lately have been expressing the view that there is too much "pop" music on the air, not only in the late evening, but most of the rest of the day. That may have been partly the reason. In the main, however, the change in the type of broadcasting schedules in the late evening and early hours of the morning is more a reflection of changing listener habits, and direct outcome of war-time conditions.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

April 25 THE RISEN LORD (EASTER SUNDAY)—John 20: 1-17. GOLDEN TEXT.—He is risen, Mark 16: 6.

Mary Recognizes Jesus 'Jesus saith unto her, Woman why weepest thou? Whom seekest thou?' The question, 'Why weepest thou?' is invested with a power of sympathy by the further question, 'Whom seekest thou?' 'She, supposing him to be the gardener, saith unto him, Sir, if thou hast borne him hence, tell me where thou hast laid him, and I will take him away. Jesus saith unto her, Mary. She turned herself, and saith unto him in Hebrew, Tabboni; which is to say, Teacher.' We cannot doubt that there would be more of the old tenderness of Jesus in the pronunciation of her name than in the words as yet spoken to her. The very mark, indeed, of the relation between Jesus and his people, when that relation is intimate, is in its most tender form, is that he calleth his own sheep by name. We are not to imagine that it is only the sound of the voice that is now recognized by Mary. By the name, by the tone in which the name is uttered, a whole flood of recollections is brought up. All the deepest and most solemn impressions that had been formed upon her by her former intercourse with Jesus are reawakened in power. She recalls not merely what was most beautiful but what was most divine in Him.

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Europe Suffers Livestock Shortage

The estimated livestock shortage in Europe is about 2,000,000 head of cattle, 1,000,000 head of sheep, and 1,000,000 head of pigs. These figures were reported by a committee of agricultural experts and the Technical Advisory Board on Agriculture last week. The shortage is due to a decline in production of livestock in many countries, and to a shortage of feed and other supplies.
