

Rotating a pasture is also good sound practice. Waste through tramping can be greatly reduced and the yield per acre is materially increased. The time of usefulness of the pasture is also considerably extended. Rotating can be very easily accomplished through the use of the electric fence. This is a practice that should be more extensively followed.
