Village Electors To Vote On Natural Gas By-Law

Measrs. Carl Lutz and Gerald Bauslaugh representing the Dominion Gas Co. were present at the Village Council meeting Tuesday evening in connection with the franchise of the Gas Co. to sell gas in this municipality.

Apparently the Company held a franchise with the Village many years ago, but has long since expired. The Company now hope to be granted a franchise for a ten year period and ask for the consent of the electors in this regard. As explained by Mr. Lutz the new franchise will in no way alter existing conditions of sale of gas, nor will it affect existing rates. "The matter of rates," he said, "is entirely out of our hands, and rests with the Natural Gas Refinery." The franchise which is lengthy will appear in the Record for three consecutive weeks, before voting which is scheduled to take place on Monday, May 31st. All persons qualified to vote at Municipal elections are eligible to vote. The by-law authorizing the franchise agreement between the Village and the Gas Co. was given first and second reading on Tuesday night and third reading will be given consideration following the voting at the end of the month.
