

But we have imagination and we can use it. And if we do, war will quite naturally become part of our daily round.



# VATICAN CITY - SPARED BY ALLIED BOMBS

For a number of years the Axis | Broadway Dramatic star of the governments dominated the radio waves of the Mediterranean. Long before the British Broadcasting Corporation was aroused to counter-action, German and Italian short wave was pounding out Axis propaganda in the native tongues of the tribes of Northern Africa and the Middle East. The United Nations only began to win the war of radio propaganda in the Mediterranean when, following the landing of United Nations troops in French Northwest Africa, they took control of Radio Algiers. From that time on, as the saying goes, they have really gone to town with a barrage of United Nations propaganda directed to the peoples of the Mediterranean area in numer ous languages, African and Euro-

pean. Moreover Radio Algiers has supplied the "Underground" press of Europe with truthful war information and encouragement to hang on until their hour of liberation arrives, supplementing thereby the short wave broadcasts directed to the occupied countries from London and Washington.
