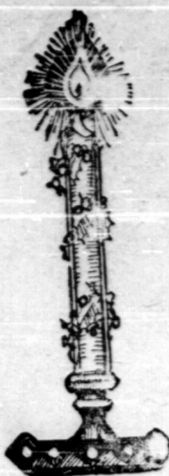

Representations before the Marketing, Distribution and Organization Committee of the Ontario Agricultural Committee of Inquiry have emphasized the need for new facilities.

Reforms in the Ontario Civil Service to improve the status of Government employees and remove them from danger of political influence will be adopted by Ontario in-Council at Queen's Park shortly.

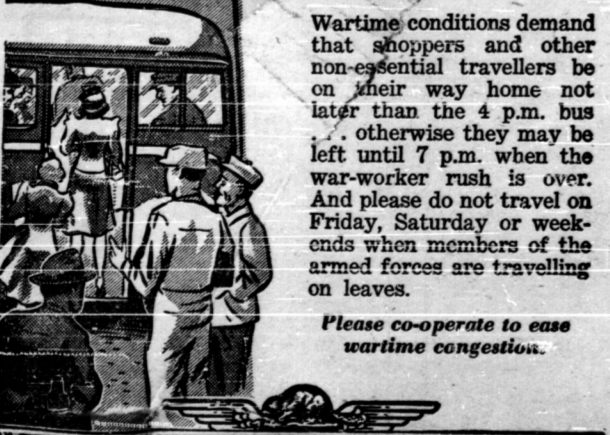
