THE THEROPUR of the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis

(1) It shall be the duty of all persons to remove and clear away any snow and ice from the premises adjoining premises owned and occupied by them immediately following the snow and ice from the premises.

(2) It shall be the duty of all persons to remove all snow and ice from the premises adjoining premises owned and occupied by them whenever such premises are situated that the non-removal of snow and ice from the premises may cause reasonable apprehension or danger to persons passing along the

In estimating the cost of housing farm machines some assumptions based on practice must be made. It is assumed that the machines are frequently stored in farm buildings and that the space is available. The one contemplating the building of a new shed, it would be wise to estimate the cost of the building at one hundred square feet and the cost of the foundation at three hundred dollars. If no practical figures are available, this investment for the storing of fifty hundred dollars worth of machinery would be a safe figure. For the provisions made for maintenance and repair, it would amount to one and one half percent of the first cost of the machine. The removal of all snow or loose ice from sidewalks adjoining vacant property and the removal of the same, and all other persons who after two weeks fail to clean the same, and to remove the same in any way all snow and loose ice from such sidewalks, streets, alleys, and public places, or in case of his or her neglect or default, the city may cause the same to be removed, and in case of non-payment of the cost thereof, the city is authorized to charge such person a special tax against such premises, in an amount not less than the amount of the cost, nor more than one Municipal Rate.

(4) Any person or persons offending against the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable under By-Law No. 43A dealing with snow removal.

(5) All previous By-Laws dealing with snow removal are hereby rescinded.

Superlatives are the order of the day in describing the Annual Meeting of the Holstein-Friesian Association held at the Grand Hotel, Toronto, February 3, at Toronto. The 2000 members and friends who broke all attendance records for the event. The Banquet, filling the Concert Hall in the Royal York Hotel to overflowing was a success. The President, J. H. Bracken who was making his first appearance at the annual meeting, took the leadership of the Program of the Conservative Party. Earlier in the evening the President was asked to attend an Annual Meeting of this, the biggest breed association in the British Empire. In the following the policy in regard to agricultural farm workers is briefly outlined:

"(1) If an agricultural worker is not a citizen of the United States, of course, free to volunteer for active service."

"(2) It is the intention of the regulations that agricultural workers are to be retained in agricultural employment as far as possible through the National Selective Service (Civilian) Regulations. To the extent that their services can be obtained in the United States during the "off crop" season they are to be encouraged to take temporary seasonal employment in such occupations as logging, forestry, fishing, coal and hawm metal mining, and acceptance of seasonal employment in any other industry not deprive men of their right to postponement as agricultural workers providing they return to farm work at the season's end."
