THE COUNTY HOME

It was our profitable experience recently to visit the Haldimand County Home at Dunnville, and as a result of that visit we came away with a far greater appreciation of the value of this institution to the County and society in general.

The managers of the home, Mrs. Bradley, possesses those qualities which make for successful administration of an institution of this sort, and meeting her provides the answer for the absolute happiness and contented attitude of the elderly people who in their declining years have found solace there.

It might be well to say first, that under Mrs. Bradley's management, the home was operated in 1942, at a cost of only \$4,822.83 to the County. That the average number of inmates was 39, and that the number of meals served during the year was 47,228. These few statistics reveal economical administration, and further facts relative to the operation of the home in connection with the home, illustrates careful planning so as to benefit from possible revenues to the fullest possible extent.

Cattle and pigs are kept at the farm and the revenue from this source in 1942 amounted to nearly \$1,500. In addition 723 lbs. of pork, 1,069 lbs. of beef and 309 lbs. of chicken were raised and butchered for use at the home. Berries, apples, eggs and potatoes also brought nearly \$500. additional revenue for

the operation of the institution. In addition 1408 quarts of fruit, jams, jellies, tomatoes, beans, peas and carrots were preserved for use at the home. The fruit cellar is one of the interesting features. Nearly 4,000 quarts of preserves are in reserve for future use, all of which was prepared under Mrs. Bradley's direction.

The general cleanliness of the institution is such that citizens of the County can point to it with pride, and if anyone harbors any doubt as to the manner in which the aged people are cared for, we would suggest they make a visit to the Haldimand County Home and see for themselves.

The Week in Ottawa

Ottawa, February 17 (C.P.)

Speculation has arisen over the form which emergency programs designed to overcome Canada's shortage of agricultural labor will take.

Mr. Mitchell made it clear that the labor department might be expected to continue to increase the duration of the war. However, the department hopes to keep such shortages to a minimum.

The continued replacement of men by women in civilian employment is regarded as one of the principal methods whereby the essential labor requirements of agriculture, mining, logging and other industries will be met.

It was in these fields, Mr. Mitchell said, that the really serious labor shortages existed.

Great Britain's long ago mobilized women workers. More than 8,000,000 British women were working full or part time either in civilian jobs or in the services of the armed forces.

These, the largest single group, are working full time in the services of the armed forces.

It is likely that the Canadian government will take further steps to induce suitable women to accept employment in civilian jobs.

Canadians who already have been asked to reduce their consumption of such staples as eggs and bacon to enable the use of other foodstuffs.

This was indicated by Frank S. Orde, deputy food administrator for the province of Ontario, who told a group of citizens that they should be prepared to accept such sacrifices.

He said it would not be enough merely to give the depressed people of Europe their liberty after the war. Canada should be prepared to ship other food materials to them besides wheat.

Owners of farm trucks, which are classified as commercial vehicles under the gasoline rationing program for the forthcoming fiscal year announced in the House of Commons by Munitions Minister Howie, will have to pay interest on the form of rationing for vehicles of this type would be outlined in newspaper advertisements.

Unofficial estimates place "millions of gallons" annually the savings which will be effected by rationing of gasoline for commercial purposes.

Mr. Howie said he believed the allowance for all types of commercial vehicles will be "reasonably adequate" for the legitimate purposes for which they are used.

However, the announcement left no doubt that owners of commercial vehicles will receive only enough gasoline to meet their essential needs, and that those operating them will be expected to eliminate unnecessary trips, drive slowly and conserve gasoline for their legitimate purposes.

A bill providing a supplementary war appropriation of \$55,000,000 was given third reading by the House of Commons early this week and will be presented to the Senate.

The amount previously voted for war purposes was \$2,000,000,000 and the supplementary appropriation was urgently required to meet government expenditures.
