

\* SINGLE MEN \*

A proc.a.nation recently issued by Hi Excellency, the Governor-General requires that every single man, born in any year from 1902 to 1923, both years inclusive, who has not already received a notice or order to report for medical examination under compulsory military service, musi compusory military service, must fill out a special form at the office of a Postmaster, a Registrar of a Mobilization Board or an Em-ployment and Selective Service Officer no. ater than February let 1943.

For this purpose the term "single or this purpose the term "single man" also inc udes any male person who was a widower, or legally separated or d'vorced and without a child or children de-pendent on him at July 15, 1940, or any such male person who has suffered the loss of his dependent child or children after that date; and any male person who. and any male person who, shough married at July 15th. 1940, since that date became a widower, legally separated or divorced, and is now without a child or children dependent on him


This then is a good time to survey the situation. If you find yourself running short put your present stocks through the fanning mill and reserve enough seed to cover your acreage. Then it would be good business to purchase western grain which is reasonable in price now to

build up your reserve of feed stocks. A good deal of grain stood out in the weather last year and its germinating power may have been reduced. If that is the case it would pay any Haldimand farmer to run a little test of his own to determine if his seed will gray the is good. intitle test of his own to determine if his seed will grow. This is good business at any time and under any circumstances. Any farmer can make his own test although he is required to have an official grade and test if intending to sell any grain for test if intending to sell any grain for seeding purposes.

All that is required to make a germination test is a container and some loamy soil. The container may be a shallow box, a four or five inch flower pot or any receptacle of similar size with a hole in the bottom to allow drainage. Select 50 or 100 average seeds representative of the whole sample and plant at the proper depth. Water to keep the soil moist but not wet. In the day time the container should be placed where it will not be too warm and at night where cool but avoid frost.

When the sprouts have emerged they should be counted. The percentage of germination may be figured by multiplying the total number of normal healthy sprouts by 100 and dividing by the number of seeds planted. With the exception of some of the grasses, there are few seeds which cannot be tested in this way.
