

SIMCOE, July 23rd, 1943 To The Electors

of Haldimand-Norfolk. I ask for your support and confidence in the approaching election on August 4th.

My duties as Attorney-General and Minister of Municipal Affairs do not permit me to spend as much time in the Riding as I would like and I would ask, therefore, you to regard this open letter as a personal call upon you.

Our first task which over-shadows all others these days is to win the war.
