

Candidate polled a total of 2107 votes, which was unlooked for in this rural riding. From the first returns reported a Liberal defeat was indicated with arry all ridings reducing the huge majority the party rolled up in 1937,

and in some cases a complete funge majority the party rolled up in 1937, 20% from 1937, with a lack of interest apparent in all divisions. The C.C.F. seemed to pull their votes from the Liberal vote of 1937, and the popularity of the Progressive Conservative Candidate in Norfolk County was particularly noted. Six out of ten municipalities in Norfolk gave Walsh a majority, whereas in 1937 only North Walsingham turned in a Conservative majority, and that was only eight votes. The Liberal Party retained a majority in ten of the sixteen Haldimand municipalities, although the County gave Walsh a majority of 121 votes over his next opponent.




