WHAT SCIENCE IS DOING

WOOD OF GROWING TREES CAN BE DYED

The staining and dyeing of which, in most cases, the color does not extend very deeply into the body of the wood, writes W. P. Keasbey in The Christian Science Monitor. An experimenter however, claims to have developed a means of coloring the wood of living trees in such fashion that when the treated trees later are felled and sawed into lumber, the wood thus obtained will be uniformly and beautifully colored from heart to bark.

The color thus introduced into the wood is said to be practically indelible, being resistant to the bleaching action either of acid

or of water.
The inventor of the process maintains also that the use of dye does not injure the tree. The trees dyed experimentally maple trees. The treatment inholes at the base of the trunk. Next, the holes are fitted with containers hung from the tree branches and serving as reservoirs

for the dye.
