P.O. Harry Gowan Presented To King And Queen During Their Inspection of Squadron

Jarvis Flyer Tells Of Happy Experience In Letter To Fireside Club

In writing to the Fireside Club of Wesley United Church, P.O. Harry Gowan in a letter which arrived this week stated, "I think I can tell you something that is news and will probably interest all of you."

The news was that Harry was personally presented to the King and Queen, and in turn presented each of his crew members.

While we all realize that it really takes something big to make news for these boys who are in the front lines over enemy territory, it still remains that for the folks back home it is a great thing to hear of our boys' experiences overseas.

His letter to the Club is reproduced in full as follows:

Dear Fireside of Wesley United

I'm afraid I'm rather late in writing to thank you for the parcel I received over two weeks ago. I guess by now you have used the contents with the exception of this King and Queen, whom I have in a better position to appreciate it, than I do.

It was very thoughtful of you to remember me in this way and I do appreciate it more than I can say. Thanks ever so much to all of you for everything you have done for me.

I think I can tell you something that is news and will probably interest all of you. My crew and I were chosen to represent the squadron at the King and Queen's inspection of the squadron on Wednesday evening, July 7th. His address will be non-political.

Adding Haldimand to his numerous duties in Brant and Norfolk Counties made a far heavier load than any one man could be expected to carry, and the new appointment locally will relieve the situation.

SPECIAL DRIVE TO SELL WAR STAMPS AND CERTIFICATES

A special campaign, dominion-wide, for the sale of War Savings Stamps and Certificates opened on June 28th and will continue until July 31st.

The slogan for this campaign is "Stamp Out the U-Boat". All the money raised is to be used in buying depth charges for our convoys and destroyers to use against enemy submarines.

"Canada's navy has a most important task to do," declared Hon. J. L. Halsey, Minister of National Defence. "Germany's submarines must be cleared from the seas. I heartily endorse the Stamp Out the U-Boat plan. Every dollar from sales of stamps will be spent to buy more depth charges to use against the U-Boats."

A depth charge costs \$90.00, representing thirty-four depth charges at \$90.00 each. These are allotted to the various centres as follows: Hagersville 5, Caledonia 6, Dunville 14, Cayuga 5, Jarvis 3.

Large posters will be on display in banks, post offices or stores with spaces for 90 "stamp-grams" that is, messages of defiance and courage to Hitler and his aides, or order; not in order of merit.

On the Farm Grant

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

Have you ordered your Western grain yet? If Haldimand farmers expect to be short of grain for the fall and winter, perhaps they should be well advised to place their orders now and take immediate delivery.

It was announced the other day that a probable eighty million bushels of grain will be shipped to Eastern Canada this coming year. The major portion of this, sixty million bushels, perhaps, will be moved during the summer and fall. At two hundred cars per day it will take five months to move that quantity.

Some fear has been expressed that the price might drop. Under normal conditions it might cause a bit of following harvest but in war-time this is unlikely. The United States is in great need of coarse grain too. Over one hundred million bushels of the 1942 crop have already gone across the line under permit. The demand is likely to be greater as the season advances. This being the case it is doubtful that prices will be any lower.

Egg grading stations in Haldimand report a serious loss to farmers through the low quality of product being brought in. In one case the receipt of eggs in B and C grades was around twenty per cent in April. In June the B and C grades have jumped to forty-two per cent. This is a serious problem. It was found that the chief reason for this condition was temperature. The eggs were stored in a barn rather than in a cool room. The warm weather for this year, rather than the usual coolness for not giving the eggs better care.

Unless we give the eggs the care they warrant we cannot hope to maintain the high quality of product available for keeping eggs at the farm, store or in the home. From forty degrees to fifty-five degrees and never above sixty-seven degrees. If you haven't a good thermometer it would pay you to get one and check the temperature of your egg storage room.

Fertile eggs start to hatch at sixty-nine degrees and say egg to the otherwise deteriorate very rapidly in quality between seventy degrees and one hundred degrees. Eggs should therefore be gathered frequently during these hot days and kept in a clean cool room of cold fresh air from all objectionable odours.

All dirty eggs automatically fall into grade C. This is another point which should be easily remedied by the flock owner. A clean pen and clean nests usually result in immediate improvement. Keeping the hens confined until noon will also help. The same procedure should be followed in enclosing soiled eggs which generally fall into B grade.

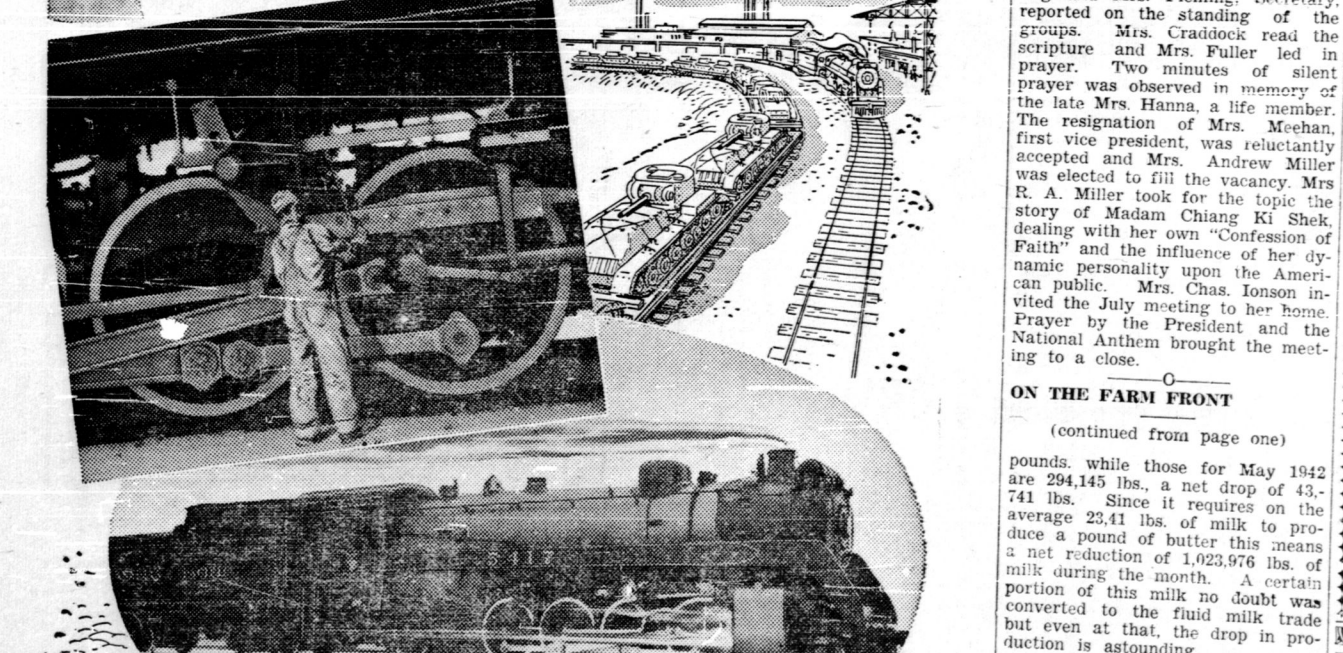

New C.P.R. Engines Keep Canada's War Goods Rolling



The first of 20 powerful new freight locomotives of the Mikado 2-8-2 class being added by the Canadian Pacific Railway this year, Engine No. 5417 was delivered on March 31 and put into immediate service in the all important job of keeping Canada's war materials rolling on schedule. Completion of the contract held by Canadian Locomotive Company in Kingston, Ont., will bring to 84 the number of new locomotives added by the Canadian Pacific since the outbreak of the war, with all of them sorely needed to meet business demands which in 1942 showed a 49.8 percent increase over 1939.

Their construction marking the use for the first time of considerable Canadian-made boiler shell plate, so far as is known, the new Mikado-type locomotives also have in their makeup Canadian-made tender tank plate in quantity for the first time. Before the war these materials came from the United States and from England but the substitutes were necessary to avoid delay in delivery of the locomotives which were ordered in January of 1942.
