From now on war workers and other essential travellers will get priority. Non-essential travellers not on busses before 4.36 p.m. may have to wait until 7.00 p.m. until the rush is over to get home.

Avoid Rush Hours Let Tired War Workers Ride

Please travel between 9.00 a.m. and 4.00 p.m. Avoid Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Leave children at home. Do everything you can not to interfere with the travelling of war workers and the Armed Forces. They have certain times only when they can travel and must have first call.

Put Your Wartime Travel on a 4-Day Week-Mon. to Thurs., 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Our biggest traffic peak is on Sunday nights. In order that members of the Armed Forces may have full advantage of their week-end feaves, they will get priority after 8.09 p.m. departures on Sunday nights. Civilians should be on their way home before 8.00 p.m., otherwise they may not be accommodated Sunday night at all and may have to wait until Monday morning. Extra busses will not be provided after 8.00 p.m. to accommodate civilians passengers.

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

Contributors to the campaign numbered slightly more than four hundred, thereby making the average contribution per person nearly \$4.50. Proteins and minerals are so very important at this time. Proteins provide for adequate growth and minerals supply the essential bone build died from grown grains and skim milk or buttermilk, or a combined protein-mineral supplement, or tankage is therefore essential. During winter, roots and well-cured alfalfa hay should be available.

The value of creep feeding cannot be over-emphasized. The sooner the small pig can be induced to eat some supplement feed the better. It has been demonstrated that pigs feeding in this way may be as much as five pounds heavier at weaning time. The general results are less drain on the system of the sow, greater uniformity within the litter and lessened mortality. Such feed should be low in fibre and easily digested.
