

GOVERNMENT SUBSIDIES AVAILABLE

As announced by the Dominion Government, the subsidy of 10c per bushel on oats and 15c per bushel on barley applies on oats and barley sold by any western farmer to a farmer or feed dealer east of Fort William-Port Arthur. Special application must be made to the Canadian Wheat Board, Winnipeg, in order to secure payment. Special forms for this purpose will be provided by the Canadian Wheat Board on request These subsidies will also be paid on community sales between farmer and farmer in western Canada, provided the farmer delivers the grain over an elevator scale and meets other equirements of the Wheat Board.
