

One of the few sources of men available for other high priority jobs is those men on the farm who will not be needed at home during the Fall and Winter. Heavy needs must be met in many linesproducing fuel wood and other necessary forest products; in base metal mines, in food processing, in railway track maintenance. If you live on a farm and are not needed at home during the Fall and Winter, you are urged to answer this national appeal.

Farmers engaged in essential work during the off season will be allowed to return home when needed. Also, those on postponement under Mobilization Regulations will continue on postponement while in approved essential work during the slack on the farm.



Jarvis District Reached Quota **Just Before Deadline Saturday**

Canada has shown again that she is behind her soldiers on the ttlefront. The magnificent total of \$1,337,000,000.00 has been raised against a quota of one billion two hundred million in the Fifth Victory Loan campaign. Good old Haldimand County, ranking third in the Province of Ontario, raised \$2,431,650.00, with still a few returns to come in, for the largest sum to be raised in any war loan in the history of the County
