CANADA STANDS HIGH-

TODAY CANADA stands higher among the nations of the world than before the outbreak of the war. Amid all the internal wranglings, Canadians may well keep this fact in mind. The strain of maintaining the pace of the struggle is splitting this country in several ways, but it is still nominally one country and it is still engaged in the war. Canada is a charter member of the war, one of that small company among the United Nations that took up the war's burden of her own free will and has continued all these terrible years, not because she was herself attacked, like Russia and the United States, but because she foresaw an attack was certain to come and went out to meet it for the safety of every Canadian home.

In spite of the blunders this country has made, her good works far outweigh her mistakes. Her allies have not always been right in all their plans and operations, and her enemies made the vast miscalculation of trying to bring the whole world to heel. In comparison with these other peoples who live on the earth today, and in the long view of the records of nations, the less than a dozen million Canadians, by early facing up to disaster, are now seen as contributing greatlty in arms and armed men to the victory that begins to appear in steadier focus somewhere through the flames and misery ahead.

SURF ON THE WHEATFIELDS-

WHEN agitation for a so-called Second Front was at its height, a member of parliament at Westminster spoke of Britain having a front on every wave. One of the most engaging features of the part Canadian youngsters are taking in this war is their day to day service on the front that has no fixed lines and no battle order, but sweeps round this contin ent and out to another.

You have to stop to think about it to sense the implications. Only when the war is over will anything like the full story be told of the job Canadians are doing in the Navy and the Merchant Navy; for seamanship in wartime is a matter of secrecy and obscurity. Even when peace comes, the story for the most part will be in general terms only.

But in thousands of homes across this

country there will be a fellow whose face is a bit wrinkled around the eyes, who occasionally will be reminded of the sky over Iceland, or the stew dished up by that corvette cook, and he'll say a few words to his kid brother, or his own children, or when he gets together with anothrecollection of these thousands will be the history of Canada in the War at Sea. DESERVE KINDLIER FATE-

IT IS questionable whether any race has suffered as much in occupied Europe as the Jews who have been hounded from pillar to post ever since the Hitlerites assumed control in Germany. From the outset the Nazis carried on an anti-Semitic campaign the horrors of which are well-known to those who have followed events in Europe during the past decade. Murder and persecution have reduced the original of more than 5,000,000 Jews in Nazi-controlled Europe to a remnant of some 2,000,000 and there is the danger that unless the murderous hand of Hitlerism is stayed soon that number will be still further reduced.

The sad plight of the Jews in Europe is recalled at this time as their co-religionists in Canada and other parts of the world observe the 26th anniversary of the Balfour Declaration which promised the establishment of a national home in Palestine for the Jewish people. When Britain was given a mandate over the Holy Land after the last war and took steps to fulfill

made in the Balfour Declaration the Arabs in Palestine objected strongly to Jew-ish immigration. The issue has never cooled

In 1939 the British Government published White Paper which stated that Jewish immigration would be permitted for the next five years at the rate of 10,000 a year. After the period of five years no further Jewish immigration would be permitted unless the Arabs of Palestine acquiesced to it. Some British leaders at the time dubbed the White Paper a breach of faith. Since no more Jews will be permitted to enter Palestine after 1944 unless other arrangements are made it is readily under-standable why there is real concern in Zionist


