

Let's be done with this self sympathy business, because things haven't been just as we might have hoped for. Our duty is still clear. We must fight on - work - sacrifice - save and lend. Yes - most of us can still lend if we want to - if we just take ourselves out of that first line position and recognize it's the boys at the front who come first. Yes, we can buy bonds and we don't need anybody giving us a slap on the back for doing our duty.

In his Labor Day speech at Harvard University, Winston Churchill said "Whatever our station may be, whatever part we have to play, great or small, our conduct is liable to be scrutinized not only by history but by our own descendants. Let us rise to the full level of our duty and of our opportunity."
